Globally and Nationally:

- Challenges in activity planning and implementation
- Impact on staff productivity and well-being
- Institutional adjustments to 'new way of working'
- Staff pay cuts and loss of employment opportunities
- Staff affected/infected by the Covid-19 and loss of staff
- Suspension of advocacy/litigation and related activities
- Loss of funding opportunities
- Organizations forced to make internal adjustments with monetary implications
- Demand for greater use of ICT



Resiliency of CSO's

The pandemic played a crucial role in CSO building resiliency. CSOs learnt the following lessons:

- Need for revenue diversification for sustainability
- Enhanced use of technology in implementation of project activities
- Strengthening CSO partnerships including in resource mobilization
- Need for CSOs to anticipate and adapt to changes
- > Enhanced institutional risk audits and assessment
- Review of Donor relations
- Prioritization of staff well-being
- Impact sensitive budgeting
